

Family Engagement as a Continuous Stream of Opportunities

- **Engaging with their children:** Families enhance their role as the child's "first teacher" through learning about their child's development, building a network and getting support for basic needs and parenting challenges.
- **Shaping programs and services:** Families partner with organizations to inform decisions, participate in planning and delivery of services and develop their leadership.
- **Influencing policies and systems:** Families use their voices and experiences to advocate for improved, family-centered, equity-driven systems, programs and services.

Guiding Principles



Foster mutual respect, trusting relationships, and shared responsibility and leadership: Respectful and trusting relationships between parents and providers are critical ingredients for effective family engagement efforts. Building trusting relationships takes time but ultimately bolsters a sense of shared responsibility, leadership, and connections to responsive services and supports.



Engage families where they are: Family engagement programs should be highly accessible and engage families in places and at times that are safe and convenient. They should be strengths-based, responsive to the diverse needs of families, focus on protective factors, and develop over time to deepen and broaden engagement.



Respect, value, and be responsive to cultural and linguistic assets: Culturally and linguistically responsive programs and providers are also critical. Providers should understand and respect cultural assets, norms, and experiences that impact family development and influence families' receptiveness to engagement strategies. Making adaptations to fit the appropriate cultural context makes programs relevant and accessible.



Support strong social networks and connections: In addition to trusting relationships, creating space to strengthen existing social networks and connections among parents and caregivers is an important part of effective engagement. This may happen in informal community settings or as a structured part of parent engagement programs.




Foster an integrated and family-centered systems approach: A systems approach should promote and institutionalize the value and practice of family engagement by creating seamless connections across programs, services, and systems. When possible, programs and services should be coordinated to promote and reinforce continuity of care, build on existing efforts in the community, and extend reach through existing services and resources.

Program Highlight: DULCE

- Innovative, **universal** pediatrics-based intervention
 - Add family specialist to primary care team
 - Intentional partnership with local early childhood communities
 - Integrate legal knowledge and resources into primary care team
- Primary care sites bolster family strengths through:
 - Structured coaching for parents on infant development milestones
 - Proactively detecting and addressing SDOH
- Intervention includes:
 - Highly structured interdisciplinary team
 - Dedicated *Family Specialist* trained and supported by:
 - Legal partnership that strengthens families' ability to secure concrete supports
 - *Brazelton Touchpoints* training and reflective mentorship to promote knowledge of parenting and child development and to strengthen collaborative parent, child and provider relationships



DULCE: Improving Family Engagement, Reducing Toxic Stress & Strengthening Families




DULCE: Programmatic Impact

- **Families respond positively to DULCE**
 - ✓ 98% of families offered DULCE accepted the intervention
 - ✓ 87% of families complete the program (main reason for non-completion is that the family moved away)
 - ✓ DULCE families participate: on average, 9 service contacts in 6 months
- **Families get more of what they need and want, thanks to Family Specialist relationship**
 - ✓ Often uncover issues not revealed through screening, especially related to depression or interpersonal violence
 - ✓ Links to social supports go beyond referral — families get the benefits they need
 - ✓ Connect parents to employment or further education
- **Relationship with Family Specialists help develop protective factors**
- **Families receive more comprehensive and effective services to meet needs**
 - ✓ Can address legal needs with “a whole new level of expertise”

The purpose of the Best Start investment is to cultivate strong collaborative efforts among parents, residents and organizations so that, together, they are a powerful catalyst for change to achieve and sustain positive outcomes for children and families in their communities.


